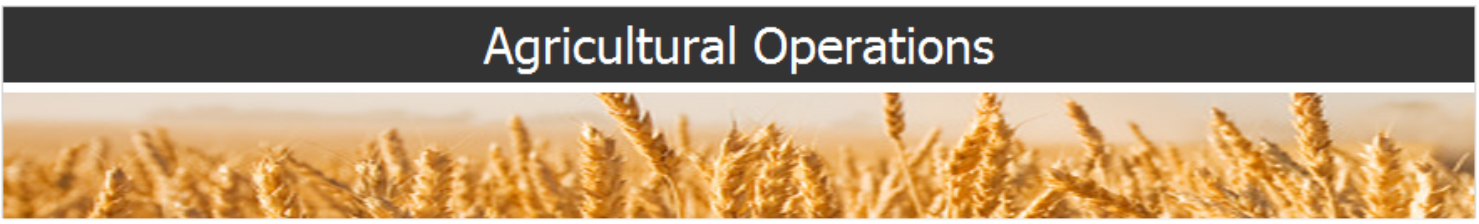

Agriculture ranks among the most dangerous industries. Between 2003 and 2011, 5,816 agricultural workers died from work-related injuries in the US.^{1,2}

- In 2011, 570 agricultural workers died from work-related injuries.¹ The fatality rate for agricultural workers was 7 times higher than the fatality rate for all workers in private industry; agricultural workers had a fatality rate of 24.9 deaths per 100,000, while the fatality rate for all workers was 3.5.²
- The leading cause of death for farmworkers between 1992 and 2009 was tractor overturns, accounting for over 90 deaths annually. The most effective way to prevent tractor overturn

Farmworkers are at high risk for fatal and nonfatal injuries, work-related lung diseases, noise-induced hearing loss, skin diseases, and certain cancers associated with chemical use and prolonged sun exposure.

Immigration Status

- ALL WORKERS, **EVEN UNDOCUMENTED WORKERS**, HAVE A RIGHT TO A SAFE AND HEALTHY WORKPLACE.
- OSHA DOES NOT IMPOSE PENALTIES FOR UNDOCUMENTED WORKERS.
- *Health and safety laws protect all employees regardless of their immigration status.* Therefore, undocumented workers have rights to information regarding their health and safety rights. They have the right to refuse unsafe work if they reasonably believe it would create a real and apparent hazard to them or their co-workers. They also can file health and safety complaints with Occupational Safety and Health Administration.
