Education & Educational Opportunities in 4-H

In 4-H, youth have an amazing opportunity to complete hands-on learning activities. Seeking education and educational resources are important to learn and grow. You may have done research for school or for a personal interest before so you already have some idea of how to find new information just not for a 4-H project. Some in your club who have been involved in 4-H for many years, might make it look easier than it feels. You might ask yourself, "how can I learn more about project areas? What/Where are some of the resources available to 4-H members and volunteers? Who is able to help 4-H members and volunteers learn?"

One of the ways 4-H members learn about their project areas is to attend club/ county 4-H project meetings. If there isn't a project leader in your club for the project you're enrolled in, ask your club leader if there is a project leader in a neighboring club who can help you. Another way to learn about project areas is to purchase 4-H curriculum (developed by universities for hands-on learning) from https://shop4-h.org/. You can read more about the importance of experiential education at https://4-h.org/about/what-is-4-h/.

The community is another great resource. 4-H is a program that encourages youth to learn by exploring their community. You might find a local expert by asking trusted older youth and adults. How about researching information at the library? Librarians are experienced at recommending great nonfiction books for youth on many topics for a variety of ages. They can also help you tell if a website is likely to have factual information. The information you decide to use needs to be research-backed. It's important to know that not everything on the Internet is sound, research-backed information. Using incorrect information for certain projects like food preservation or electricity could be dangerous. If you would like more ideas, I encourage you to contact our Extension Office to ask for help finding resources.

If you are a member or volunteer with many years of experience, it might be time to learn by teaching. 4-H offers educational opportunities that help you push yourself to new levels of mastery and independence. Enroll as a youth leader in a project area to learn new skills and teach others, join a judging team and compete, or attend a project area competition (i.e. Area Animal Sciences Day, State Dog Show, Youth Plant Science Day, etc.). Become an expert in something that makes you smile!

The climax for many 4-H members in our county is exhibiting at the Rock County 4-H Fair. 4-H members and members of other youth organizations enter non-animal and animal exhibits to highlight their accomplishments, but the best time to learn about project areas is every day of the year! It takes time to learn about project areas, ask questions and practice skills. 4-H members and volunteers invest time year round teaching and learning new skills, perfecting techniques and seeking educational opportunities to learn more about project areas.

How do I find out about 4-H project meetings?

Attend your local <u>4-H Club meetings</u> where project leaders will announce upcoming project meetings. Project leaders may also call, text or send an email about meetings. County -level meeting notifications are usually on the <u>Extension calendar</u>, emailed to members, on the <u>Extension website</u> under projects or on the project's Facebook page.

May I attend 4-H Junior & Senior Council meetings?

If you are a 4-H member who is sixth grade or older, you're invited to attend Junior Council meetings. If you are a 4-H Volunteer Leader, you're invited to attend Senior Council meetings. Please come and learn more! Junior & Senior Council meetings are held together, usually on the fourth Monday of the month. During the meetings, the Councils discuss Rock Co. 4-H events, participate in handson leadership activities, discuss funding as well as share opportunities and ideas for youth and adults to bring back to their clubs. All members are invited to sign up for committees for various Rock County 4-H events.

How do I join a Rock County 4-H committee?

To join a committee (Achievement Celebration, Children's Christmas Benefit, Bowling Bonanza, Communication Arts Festival, Volleyball, Music & Drama Festival, Cloverbud Field Trip, Softball, Fair Activity Committee, Cloverbud Day Camp) simply sign up at a Junior/Senior Council meeting or call the Extension Office (608-757-5066) to sign up. If there isn't a committee for an activity or event that you are interested in, bring up your idea(s) at the Junior/Senior Council meetings or call the Extension Office to find out how to proceed with your idea.

How do I volunteer to become a 4-H Leader?

To become a 4-H Volunteer in Wisconsin, there are four steps:

- 1. Enroll online in the 4HOnline database at https://www.4honline.com/
- 2. View the online Mandated Reporter Training through 4HOnline.
- 3. Attend a 2-hour <u>VIP (Volunteers in Preparation)</u> <u>Training</u>. Registration is required. The next scheduled VIP Training is 9:00-11:00 a.m. Saturday, February 22. VIP Trainings are at Rock County Extension, 3506 N. US Hwy. 51, Building A, Janesville.
- 4. Have a background check done and pass. (Please watch for and respond quickly to an email link requesting permission and information for a background check.)

Thank you so much to all club representatives at the Junior/ Senior Council meeting. We are very excited to continue our conversation about ways to work together to grow the Rock County 4-H program. To summarize, in November participants identified the following:

A fun way to get to know people and ideas is to try Speed Dating. Speed Dating is an activity in which participants have one to three note cards. The note card can have a question to answer, an idea to share or analyze, a prompt to fill in the blank, etc. Each individual reads his or her card. After doing so, they exchange the cards they shared and look for a new person to pair up with.
