1. Why does this project interest you?

I love goats of any age and breed, and I want to promote the dairy goat project because so few people take it. Also, I'm used to showing small animals, like chickens, that you carry around. Showing a larger animal like a goat will offer me a different challenge when it comes to care and handling.

2. List four goals for this project this year. What would you like to do, learn, make, improve in your project?

Example: Learn what the judge is looking for in a dairy cow.

- 1. Learn about goat body parts, both internal and external.
- 2. Learn about different breeds of dairy goats.
- 3. Learn how to properly lead a goat around when showing.
- 4. Learn how to "set up" a goat when showing.

Years completed in project as Member (3rd grade and up): 1

Explain <u>how/why</u> you did/did not complete each of your goals this year.
Example: Learned by attending a county workshop that a judge is looking for straight legs and a level top line on a dairy cow.

1. Learned most of the internal and external body parts of a Dairy Goat by studying and actually finding the parts on a real goat. Some basic body parts are the poll, barrel, chine, loin, withers, and rump.

2. Learned all of the common breeds of dairy goat by studying images and information on the Internet and by seeing different breeds in real life. The 8 breeds of dairy goat recognized by the American Dairy Goat Association are the Nubian, Alpine, Toggenburg, Saanen, Oberhasli, La Mancha, Nigerian Dwarf, and Sable.

3. Learned how to lead a goat properly by listening to the Dairy Goat project leaders, and then practicing. First, you hook your fingers into the goat's collar and then move forward. Untrained goats generally resist this maneuver, so constant practice is important.

4. Learned how to set-up a goat during judging by following my Dairy Goat project leader's instructions. Arrange the goat's legs so that its front hooves fall below its shoulders, and its back legs are slightly extended. A non-milking goat's back legs should be set apart about as wide as the body. A milking doe's legs should be set wider apart in order to properly show the udder.

2. What new skills or knowledge did you learn this year (including tools, equipment and literature)? Example: Learned at a project meeting how to take notes for oral reasons using a comparison system between placings.

I learned how to properly hand milk a goat. It is not hard, but it does take practice to become an efficient milker. To milk, you grasp a teat with each hand and begin squeezing the teats in a steady, downward motion. Squeeze the upper part of the teat with one or two of your fingers first to prevent the milk from flowing backward, and then squeeze with the rest of your hand. Once a stream of milk flows out of the teat, release the pressure on the teat and do the above motions again. Continue the alternate squeezing and releasing until the udder is deflated and the milk tapers off.

3. What were some of the problems you had with this project, and how did you deal with them?

My main problem was that I live in the city, and can't keep my own goats. Fortunately, there is another person in my 4-H club who has been showing goats for several years. She wanted more people to get involved in the project, and kindly allowed both my sister and I to show some of her goats. Under her teaching, I enjoyed learning just as much about goats as I could have if I had some of my own.

4. Why are or why are you not satisfied with your accomplishments this year?

I am very satisfied with my accomplishments. At the beginning of the year, I knew virtually nothing about Dairy Goats. Then, after spending a good deal of time with goats, I learned how to raise newborn kids, groom goats for fair, participate in showmanship, and perform well in the show ring.

5. Explain in detail the leadership qualities/skills you gained in this project. (Ex. ability to initiate, inspire, commit, plan, organize, communicate, delegate, problem solve, execute, etc.) To do this project, I had to initiate contact with a 4-H friend who had goats, and plan my involvement in raising goats with her and her family. We worked out a schedule, which included caring for the goats, practicing showmanship, and preparing the goats for show.

At the Stoughton and Dane County Fairs, I answered questions from the public about caring for and showing goats. I also demonstrated the correct milking technique, and taught some younger 4-H members how to milk and feed goat kids.
