Economic Snapshot is a weekly feature provided by the o more people move to Dane County from Los Angeles or from Kenosha? The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) reports that between 2000 and 2005, a total of 640 people migrated from Los Angeles County to Dane County compared to 561 from Kenosha County. According to the IRS, 99,154 people moved into Dane County and 91,183 moved out during those five years.

The IRS data is based on the year-to-year changes in addresses on individual income tax returns. It provides a good indicator of where new Dane County residents come from and where former county residents moved.

Tracking population Week One:

Coming to Dane County Cook County, Illinois (Chicago), and Milwaukee County ranked first and second, providing more than 8,500 new Dane County residents combined. Almost 18,000 people moved from the seven other counties in the Thrive region (Columbia, Rock, Jefferson, Iowa, Sauk,

Dodge and Green Counties).
