

Weekly Hay Market Demand and Price Report for the Upper Midwest as of January 24, 2015

All hay prices quoted are dollars per ton FOB point of origin for alfalfa hay unless otherwise noted.

The information presented in this report is compiled from public and private sales and reports in the Midwest.

Demand and Sales Activity

With moderate temperatures this past week hay supplies at auctions was good, but demand was light compared to the previous week. Small square bales increased because of limited sales of only prime and grade 1 hay. Large square bale prices were \$1.00 per ton weaker this week, but premium quality alfalfa demands a good price. Large round bale prices were up 9% with increased price in medium to lower quality hay. Summing up the markets, sales activity was light, supplies were good, quality hay sold for a good price, and large round bale hay saw a price increase.

For *Nebraska*, compared to the last report alfalfa hay sold unevenly steady. For *Iowa*, premium quality small square alfalfa bales sold for a good price, while other classes of hay prices were weaker.

In South Dakota, hay prices were steady with light reported volume this week.

For *Missouri*, hay movement has moved up a tick. Most sales of large round bales are occurring between neighbors. Decreased fuel prices have encouraged the sale of dairy quality hay, but decreased milk prices have offset the fuel savings.

In *Southwest Minnesota*, no hay prices were reported this week. For *Illinois*, Dyersville market had heavy offerings with a fair demand. Premium quality dairy hay was in demand with good prices, while lower quality hay prices were weak. In *Wisconsin*, hay prices improved compared to last week with an increase in fair and good quality large packaged bales.

Straw prices in the Midwest averaged \$2.95 per small square bale (range of \$1.50 to \$5.00); \$40.50 per large square bale (range of \$35.00 to \$46.00); and \$37.00 per large round bale (range of \$27.50 to \$42.50). Compared to the previous week, straw prices for small square bales were steady. For large square bales, prices were up slightly, while large round bales were weaker. There is good demand for quality small square bales of wheat straw.
