

Hay Market Demand and Price Report for the Upper Midwest For June 11, 2018

All hay prices quoted are dollars per ton FOB point of origin for alfalfa hay unless otherwise noted.

The information presented in this report is compiled from public and private sales and reports in the Midwest.

Hay auction data is collected on the first and third week of the month and posted the following Monday when possible. Prices quoted in this report are for "as fed" alfalfa hay.

Demand and Sales Comments

Hay prices were weaker this past week. Two factors may have played into the price change; (1) Hay harvest is progressing and (2) less demand for hay at the auctions. Most cattle have moved onto pasture and good weather has decreased hay feeding.

For Nebraska, a lightly tested market this week. Good buyer inquiries with light demand. Ground hay prices were steady destined for feedlots. *For Iowa*, hay and straw were scarce this week at auction. Prices were steady for alfalfa.

In South Dakota, new crop hay prices have been steady. Hay supply was depleted with an extended feeding period this past spring.

For Missouri, harvest is in full swing between rain showers. Yields are below anticipated expectations.

In Southwest Minnesota, little dairy quality hay available with lower prices. There was an increase in supply this week.

In Wisconsin, first crop is being harvested between rain showers. Local markets have light demand for hay and with lower prices this week.

Straw prices were stronger this week. Small square bale straw price averaged \$3.50 a bale (range of \$1.50 to \$7.00). Large square bale straw prices averaged \$38.00 per bale (a wide range of \$19.00 to \$72.00). Large round bale straw averaged \$44.00 per bale (range of \$25.00 - \$70.00).
