

Hay Market Demand and Price Report for the Upper Midwest For October 9, 2017

All hay prices quoted are dollars per ton FOB point of origin for alfalfa hay unless otherwise noted.

The information presented in this report is compiled from public and private sales and reports in the Midwest.

Hay auction data is collected on the first and third week of the month and posted the following Monday when possible. Prices quoted in this report are for "as fed" alfalfa hay.

Demand and Sales Comments

Overall there is some upward movement in hay prices, but still a wide range in prices. Most markets are steady to stronger as we move through the fall harvest season.

For Nebraska, prices are steady with light demand for baled hay this week due to rainfall. For Iowa, prices were steady with weak under tones. Most parts of the state received some welcomed rain.

In South Dakota, hay sold steady with weaker undertones. Rainfall may have reduced interest in purchasing hay,

For Missouri, hay supplies are moderate, demand is light and prices are steady. Many are marketing calves early and culling cows to reduce purchased forages.

In Southwest Minnesota, not much change at this market with adequate supply of mixed hay, price trend is steady with limited quality hay available.

In Wisconsin, corn silage harvest is on everyone's mind this week. There is demand for quality hay just not much of a supply at auctions. Overall hay supply may contribute to a depressed price currently at the market.

Hay export report for October 6, 2017, only 550 tons of alfalfa hay were exported at an average price of \$190.00 per ton from USDA.

Straw prices were steady this week. Small square bale straw price was steady and averaged \$3.10 a bale (range of \$1.50 to \$5.00). Large square bale straw increased \$3.00 a bale this week and averaged \$41.00 per bale (range of \$25.00 to \$74.00). Large round bale straw was \$4.00 higher and average of \$43.00 a bale (range of \$26.00-\$48.00). Straw was in demand with a limited supply.
