As you are researching and practicing in the kitchen, be on the look out for possibilities to enter in our "Wisconsin's Dairy Best" Category.



The next meeting will be held on Monday, February 21st from 6:30 p.m. - 8:30 p.m. at the Shawano Courthouse, Rooms A & B.


On March 12th, camp counselors will be meeting together from 8:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. in Bonduel for a full day training and planning session.

Supporting Youth Mental Health for Volunteers

Adults who volunteer with young people, care about young people. One way to show we care is to give help and support when someone is feeling down. That's what the Supporting Youth Mental Health for Volunteers Training—Supporting YMH, for short—is all about: knowing how to support youth when they're down,

Supporting YMH has two parts:

- 1. A 1-hour online training
- 2. A 1.5-hour live training—offered virtually or in-person

whether it's simply a bad day or it's more than that.

What You'll Learn:

Through interactive online learning, practice situations, and discussion, participants will learn about:

- Volunteers' important role in supporting youth mental health
- The signs and symptoms of a mental health challenge, including suicidal ideas or attempts
- Simple skills and strategies to build trusting relationships and approach a youth who is struggling
- Roles, responsibilities, and resources for volunteers who support youth

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PROJECT UPDATES

Livestock Learning Opportunities Scheduled

Each junior fair livestock (beef, sheep, swine, meat goat) exhibitor MUST earn three livestock meeting credits each year to be eligible to sell an animal in the Shawano County 4-H Market Animal Sale.

There are a number of workshops, both in person and virtual, that you may attend in order to attain your credits. You must fill out an "Educational Session" form afterwards for the education

to count as a credit. https://tinyurl.com/2022ShawanoLVSKCredits Additional information will be distributed at the February 22nd informational meeting. Additionally, check the Shawano 4-H Livestock Facebook page and Extension Shawano County website at https://fyi.extension.wisc.edu/shawano4h/animal-sciences/ for up to date information.

ALL first and second year exhibitors and parents/guardians are strongly encouraged to attend. All other members are welcome to attend as well. All members attending may receive one livestock meeting credit upon their attendance and sign in. All members in attendance MUST sign in at each meeting to receive their livestock credit.

DNA/RFID EAR TAG kits will be available at the Livestock Information Meeting. If you don't attend this meeting, they will be distributed from the Extension Office - with exhibitors responsible for picking them up.

Poultry & Rabbit Members

Important for Poultry members! When ordering new chicks or buying any new birds please remember to get a NPIP Certificate or Flock Status Certificate from the seller. This paperwork is required in order to show at the fair. Also, members raising turkeys should get the NPIP paperwork from the hatchery.

Reminder for Poultry & Rabbit Members

You must attend at least 1 meeting and 1 fair work day to be able to exhibit at the fair. All market exhibitors will also be required to attend 1 Market Meeting to be able to sell their animal in the auction. Mark these dates on your calendar now and watch for updates and/or additions in future Clover Line newsletters! PROJECT UPDATES

Important Info For All Shooting Sports Members and Parents

The Shooting Sports Key Committee wants to make you aware of some important policies within the Shawano County Shooting Sports Program.

All youth participants at practices need to be at least 8 years old by January 1, of this year and in the 3rd grade in school. This is a state enforced rule. Cloverbuds are still encouraged to attend wildlife sessions as in the past. In order to participate in the County Fair Shoot this year, you must attend at least 4 scheduled practices or 4-H competitions in the discipline you plan to compete in. Why? Shawano County 4-H Shooting Sports Key Committee members want to make sure everyone understands and follows the rules pertaining to safety for archery and air guns. Requests for special consideration should be submitted in writing to the Key Committee before entering the county fair shoot.

"Expectation and Guidelines" forms will be emailed or available at each practice. It will cover important points regarding eligibility and participation in the program. Each member and their parent/guardian will be expected to sign this form upon receipt and return to the leader at practice. A copy should be kept with the member for review.

THRIVE UPDATE

High quality 4-H program settings provide youth a place to belong, matter and explore their personal spark. High quality settings foster developmental relationships with youth, relationships that express care, challenge growth, and share power. These components help ensure that 4-H programs provide a nourishing **developmental context** – a place where youth can belong and grow. *Please continue reading on page 8 for a snapshot of Shawano's scores.*



4-H Thriving Model – Program Quality Scores

Shawano County - 2021

The 4-H Thriving Model predicts that youth who participate in 4-H programs that provide a high-quality developmental context will thrive, and thriving youth achieve key developmental outcomes.

To determine scores for Program Quality, youth members age 13 and up were invited to take an online survey asking them questions about their 4-H experience. The survey was developed by Mary Arnold, Oregon State University and Ryan Gagnon, Clemson University. Wisconsin served as a pilot state for administering the survey in 2020 & 2021.

After analyzing data, the scores are provided which assess each component of the model on a scale of 1-7, 7 meaning outstanding program quality.

Youth Sparks

The Youth Sparks outcome measures how 4-H programs give youth opportunities to explore topics they are interested in learning about, passionate about, engaged with.

5.7

Challenging Growth

Challenging Growth outcome measures the extent to which adults in the program help youth to see new possibilities, push them to reach higher and hold them accountable.

6.1

Youth Belonging

This outcome measures how safe, welcome and supported youth feel in 4-H programs

5.9

Youth-Adult Partnerships

This outcome measures how youth feel about adult volunteers working with them and if they feel respected, listened to and have their ideas taken seriously.

Caring Adults

This outcome measures how youth feel the adults in their 4-H programs care about them and investing time in

Overall Score

Implications:

The data suggests that the program quality in Shawano County 4-H is good, and there is room to grow. The lower score for Youth Sparks is not surprising – Sparks are tied to the opportunities to learn new things (projects) and develop an interest in a topic/project. In 2021, we have been working on ways to offer more project-based learning for members. Caring adults is a great start. I will be looking at ways to recruit more volunteers and offer additional training on creating a safe and caring environment for youth to learn. Since this was the first year for this survey, this is a good benchmark for future analysis.

Major Fair Book Revisions

Major Changes in Junior Fair Book for 2022

Beef - Judging time change

- Junior Market and Showmanship will remain at 4pm on Thursday
- Feeder calves, breeding stock and open class is moving to Friday morning, approximately 11am
- Also addition of a Performance feeder calf class-optional class for feeder animals if you intend to carry your project animal over through next year's fair.
 - o Animals must be eartagged and DNA sampled and submitted by August 1.
 - O Animal will be weighed in at this year's fair during regular fair weigh in.
 - Judging criteria is as follows:

This year's feeder calf ranking in class 25 pts Next year's carcass results 25 points

Next year's market animal placing 25 pts Rate of gain from fair to fair 25 points

Total = 100 points

Goats:

- Meat Goats are now joining the Livestock auction, no longer Small Animal
- All goats now under here, including pygmy, fainting, etc.

Goats and Sheep: Shows are moving to 8am on Friday (an hour earlier) to accommodate beef

Exotics:

- Due to low entries for many years, this department has been eliminated in both junior & open.
- If you have a member who enrolled in exotics Terri has reached out to them to change to appropriate area if concerned about fair. Many were entering pets, ie: chinchillas, etc. There are still a couple who have not responded yet but we will be following up.

Club Planter – new and additional guidelines

- Club Planter (Using wheelbarrow, ½ of 55 gallon plastic drum or container of same approximate size).
- Planters must contain a minimum of 12" of soil or plant growing material. (may fill remaining with Styrofoam or similar substance to reduce weight.)
- Create a planter using only live (not artificial) plants, may be flowering or foliage. Endangered wild plant specimens are not allowed. May add other items to tell message.
- Club name must be displayed in the planter. May have a message, does not need to.
- May be set-up inside or outside of North end of the Huntington Family 4-H Building.

"Exhibit" may be a poster, PowerPoint, scrapbook, diary, collection, chart, display or any other idea that shows your work in the best possible way. If on a computer, you must have something on paper to be left as a display.

- Judging is Saturday prior to the Fair in the Junior Fair Building (Refer to Clover Line for schedule.).
- Using Face to Face Judging System.
- Make sure you read ALL "Rules & Regulations" in front of Premium Book!
- Articles must be planned and designed by member and the result of this year's work.

Celebrate Art (Class A & B) rules:

- Open to members enrolled in the Celebrate Art project or youth groups doing equivalent work.
- All wall-hangings must be suitably framed, matted, or mounted so it can be hung at the fair. Matted or mounted pictures will be stapled for display. Entries not properly finished will be dropped a placing.
- Entries may include one item, pairs or sets.
- Place small items (jewelry, stamping, stenciling, etc.) in a plastic bag or small box for display.
- All drawing and painting entries on carwas or paper must be entered in Class B.
- Exhibitors may not enter an item in "any other" that fits into any other department. (Ex. knitting, woodworking, etc.)
- *Items marked with an asterisk must be signed and dated. If not, will be dropped a placing.
- **Additional entries of a listed media type may only be entered under "any other" AND only if different techniques were used. Example: enter ceramics and "any other" if you have a glazed item and a drybrushed item.
- Limit 10 entries in Class A and a total limit of 15 entries in Classes A & B combined.
