

- The grant's mission aligns with your goals
- The funding and timing meet your needs
- You are eligible to apply
- The chance of getting funded is reasonable
- You have the capacity to deal with the "hassle factor"

Farmer Rancher Grant Program

- Grants directly fund farmers and ranchers to explore new production methods or marketing approaches for their farm
- Up to \$15,000 for individual farm, and up to \$30,000 for 2 or more farms
- Encouraged to link with university or non-profit partners
- Proposals due December 5, 2024, 4:00pm
- Funding decisions late Feb 2025



Reviewer Questions for Farmer-Rancher grants

Project Leader or Team (10%)

• Do the people involved have the experience and skills to successfully carry out the project?

Project Design (30%)

- Is there a well-thought-out, detailed plan to **solve a problem** on the farm or ranch using sustainable agriculture practices?
- For education and demonstration projects, is there a well-thoughtout, detailed plan to provide potential solutions for other farmers/ranchers through information sharing?
- Are there clear objectives with specific and appropriate activities, materials and methods?
- Is there an appropriate timeline?

Reviewer Questions for Farmer-Rancher grants

Contribution to Sustainable Agriculture (15%)

- Does the project build on and add to existing sustainable agriculture knowledge?
- Does the project have the potential to help farmers and ranchers in the North Central region produce positive environmental, economic, and social impacts?

Outreach (20%)

 Are there specific plans to cooperate with other farmers and/or organizations to share information? Some options for information sharing include: workshops, field days, publications, written materials, social media, a web page, radio, television, making a video, presenting a poster or giving a talk at a conference or other event.

Also Evaluation (15%) and Budget (10%)
