EXPANDING ACCESS FOR ALL

This year we received the FY22-23 Dean's Innovation Grant for an Accessible Bird Outings program, which supported us in connecting with over 100 community members and 18 organizations to increase accessibility in the outdoors. We also started a new partnership with Access Ability Wisconsin which provided outdoor wheelchairs to our school field trip program and community days.
